Director Anna Sobel has been a professional puppeteer since 1998. She was employed as a puppeteer for Kids on the Block for three years and Blue Sky Puppet Theatre for two years. In 2003 she was the recipient of a Fulbright Fellowship to study puppetry in India as a tool for social change and education. She spent nine months in India and founded Talking Hands Theatre on her return to New York in 2004. After six busy years in the city, she moved her company to Western Massachusetts and is now based in Shutesbury, MA.

In addition to performing, Sobel worked as a teaching artist in public schools all over New York through Shadowbox Theatre and Brooklyn Arts Council. In 2008 she was honored as the Laura Adasko Lenzner artist in residence at the Bank Street School for Children. After completing her BA at Wesleyan University, she went on to study literacy and early childhood education at Bank Street College and now also holds a master's degree in educational theatre from N.Y.U.
